

Manion, Mannion & Manning New Cathedral Cemetery, Section Q, Lot 14

William Manion was born to **Catherine Hanley/Mannion** in Roscommon, Ireland, before she married **John Coffay**. William lived most of his life in Baltimore on Mount Royal "Grasshopper" Hill, just a short distance from his mother, Catherine, and his step-father, John Coffay. William Manion's Coffay siblings were a part of his life and the lives of his children.

William Manion married Mary Coyle, and they raised eight children on Grasshopper Hill. One of their sons, Frank Manion, left Baltimore in 1896 and settled in Philadelphia, PA.

Frank Manion died in 1920 in Philadelphia, and has many descendants. Frank didn't share much information about his family in Baltimore, and they were virtually forgotten by the Philadelphia Manions, until in about 1980, when one of his grandsons, **John J. Manion, Jr.**, began to search for whatever became of Frank Manion's Baltimore relatives. The only information he had to go on was that Frank's parents were named **William Manion** and **Mary Coyle**, and that Frank had a brother named **Mike** and a sister named **Mary Sacks**.


During the next twenty years, beginning in the pre-internet age, John (called Jack) and his wife, Pat, went on a search to track down the Baltimore Manions. The search led them to Salt Lake City and the Mormon Family History Library. They searched in the Maryland Historical Society in Baltimore and went to Annapolis, Maryland, to search in the Hall of Records where they were able to locate the death certificate of William Manion, which gave his burial place as New Cathedral Cemetery. Jack and Pat visited the cemetery and were able to look at the original records of the family Lot.

This is what they saw:

Jack was sure that this was his family, but was perplexed by the different spellings of the name. Here were Mannions, Manions, and a Manning. What was the correct way to spell the family name?

From his research, Jack knew his great-grandparents were **William Manion** and **Mary Coyle Manion** and that Michael Coyle was Mary Manion's father.

Who were the other **Mannions** and the **Manning**? Jack wasn't sure. The graves were at Section Q, Lot 14 and he was disappointed that it was an unmarked lot. Jack went ahead and ordered a stone to be put on the lot with the names of those he was sure of: his great-grandparents, William and Mary Manion, and his great-great-grandfather, Michael Coyle. So, in 1994, after one hundred years, the Mannion/Manion/Manning lot at New Cathedral Cemetery finally had a marker.

So, who were the other **Mannions** and **Manning** buried in the lot? Jack died in 2006 and wasn't able to find out for himself. Since then, much of the mystery has been solved, and for whatever reasons, these were the spellings that the family members used to write their names.

A second marker for the **Manion/Mannion/Manning** lot was installed in September, 2010. This stone is located right behind the **MANION** stone. The names of the three infants of William & Agnes (Mooney) Mannion were not included on the stone.

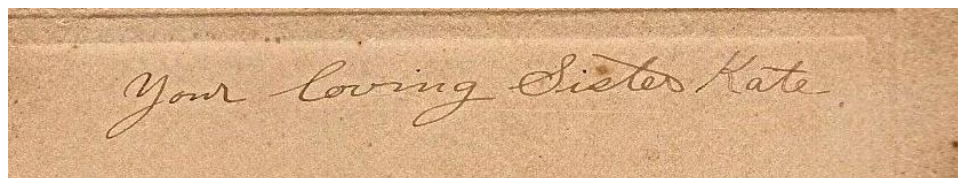

Family Photo:

This is the only photograph we have, so far, of an ancestor buried at this site. It is probably **Catherine “Kate” Mannion**. The photo was among the possessions of **Stella Mannion Gunther**, the youngest daughter of **William & Mary Manion**. There is a handwritten inscription on the back: “your loving sister, Kate.” Catherine was known as “Kate,” and was even named Kate Manion in her death notice in the Baltimore Sun Paper. The photographer’s studio was in Indianapolis. Kate may have been in the Midwest when the photo was taken. There were several Coyles (her mother’s family) who settled in the Chicago area. Kate may have been employed or visiting family there. She died of consumption at her family’s home on Elm Street, Baltimore, at age 26, in the year 1893.
