DEATH FROM THE STORM

Though minor accidents were numerous, only one death in this city has been traced to the storm. **Patrick Horan**, forty years old of 246 Croskey st. was the victim. He was a driver for a mercantile concern, and while he was getting out of the way of a car at 16th and Sansom sts. yesterday afternoon his wheels skidded and struck another wagon.

Horan was shaken from his seat by the shock, and the wheels of his own wagon passed over his head, killing him almost instantly.²

SNOW AND GALE DESCEND ON CITY

One death and more than a dozen persons injured by falls was the accident harvest of the storm.

The dead man is **Patrick Horan**, of 246 Croskey street. While trying to turn a wagon he was driving out of a car track at Sixteenth and Sanson streets he was thrown to the street and killed. The wheels of the wagon skidded on the slippery street and **Horan** tumbled off his seat and fell on his head. The dead man was employed by Jennings & Co. coal dealers at Fifth street and Washington avenue.³
